TINTING OUR CIRCUMSTANCES By Eliot Fay

A couple of months ago Jessie added "paint the bedroom" to the running list of house repairs and improvements we have. This happens to be one of my least favorite home improvement tasks not because I mind the actual painting itself, but because the process of settling on a color always feels harder than it should be. So a few weeks ago I googled "good paint colors" hoping to find some specific color suggestions, but instead found myself stumbling into the world of paint color psychology - how paint color and hue can have a measurable effect on our emotions.

The general overview is as follows (because I know you want to know!): red and orange tend to encourage activity and increase energy level and as such are recommended in living rooms or dining rooms to encourage conversation and interaction in the evening; yellow promotes feelings of openness and happiness; light blue tones tend to encourage feelings of peacefulness and calm and so are commonly suggested as a good option for bedrooms; darker blues tend to induce sadness; and green shades seem to be the most versatile as they promote feelings of warmth and comfort and are therefore suggested as a good choice for any room. I find it interesting that everything in a room can remain the same – the furniture, the flooring, the structure, the lighting – and the purpose or use of the room can remain the same, and yet the way you feel in that room and respond to that room apparently can be changed by a slight adjustment in color.

It is with similar intention that the Apostle Paul reminds the Roman Christians of the depth and breadth of the love of Christ for all of them...

"Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Shall trouble or hardship or persecution or famine or nakedness or danger or sword...For I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord." Romans 8:35, 38-39

There is nothing in this verse or any other part of Scripture that tells us that our faith delivers us from the hard moments of life. Financial troubles, health issues, relationship tensions, work or school stresses - these realities do not vanish as we call to mind the love of Christ for us. This reassurance can though, affect the way we perceive and respond to these difficult times by tinting our circumstances in shades of hope and peace and comfort. And so when we find ourselves facing hardship in this new year, let us bring to mind Paul's reminder that there is no situation in which we are alone or unseen or unloved by God.

(Unfortunately, Paul offers no advice on choosing paint colors...)


