Rise to New Life By Jessie Fay

In January many people turn their minds to how they can remake their lives, or how they can add meaning to them. In the Southern Baptist church I grew up in it was also peak season for baptisms, coming off of Christmas- the second busiest time of year for altar calls. There was something about all the twinkle lights that made people want to get themselves saved, and I was no different. I can even remember the sermon that compelled me to the alter: The annunciation. Mary. Her total willingness to submit herself to God's plan to rescue a broken world. That degree of humility and trust was awe-inspiring... Also, my grandmother had been suggesting for quite awhile that she would feel better about the state of my immortal soul if I would go ahead and take the plunge- so that Sunday I made my way to the front of the church during the "invitational hymn" and dedicated my life to Christ. I was almost five.

My great-grandfather had been a well respected minister in our small town, and he and all his descendants tried to help me understand my new commitment. I remember being told that, since I had "accepted Jesus into my heart," He lived there now. I was all good salvation-wise. The only thing left to do, he explained, was to profess my faith publicly to the church through baptism, which I did a few weeks later. The reason for immersion within the Baptist tradition, by the way, is symbolic. As I was immersed, my great-granddaddy said what he said over all he baptized: "Since you have professed your faith in accordance with the Lord's command, I baptize you, (Jessie Lane), in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit. *Buried in the likeness of his death, now rise to new life in Him.*" I came up for air expecting some sort of immediate change; that I should somehow feel more "holy." Instead, I felt the same. It was a bit of a let down, but at least no one was worrying about my soul anymore. I also got a cake and some presents out of the experience, so all was well! I had checked off an important box, I believed all the right things, and people were satisfied with me. I wondered if God was.

Ten years later our church partnered with a Spanish speaking congregation; best I know, we rented our chapel to them- but the partnership extended far beyond that. Pastor and Mrs. Esquivel lived out Christ's call to love the poorest among us, and invited our church's youth to join them. Their ministry and our involvement in it caused a bit of a scandal. I can remember many of our parents not being particularly pleased with us (or our youth minister) for joining them in the housing projects, but joined them we did- offering weekly check-ins, providing supplementary meals and clothing to families when necessary, playing and singing with the kids in a "children's service" each Saturday. I can tell you without reservation that this is where I came alive; not at the moment of my baptism, but there in the projects- being shown how to live out the kind of faith my baptism had called me to, within the relationships that were made there.

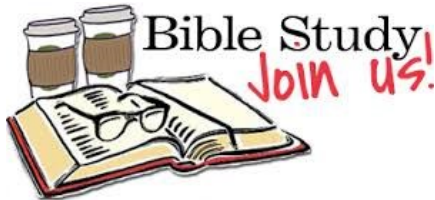
My beliefs about most things have changed over the years. Mostly I've just traded mystery for mystery.... But I do feel that I now have a better understanding of those words my great granddaddy spoke over me when I was five. We can only truly live the life that we were designed for when we die to ourselves and live to serve others. That, to me, is what it means to follow Christ: Checking off boxes and believing the "right" stuff is all well and good, but the state of our souls- the extent to which we experience joy and wholeness on this earth- depends on the degree to which we allow ourselves to be a part of God's plan to make our broken world whole. May we all resolve to rise more fully into new life in 2024: Let us seek to act justly, love mercy, and walk humbly with God as a church family— and find great joy in doing so. Happy New Year!

The Nelson Congregational Church is pleased to announce the recipients of the 2023 Garrett-Larsen Social Justice awards. A total of \$2,250 was awarded in December 2023, split between two local nonprofits.

\$1,250 was given to the Fall Mountain Weekend Food Backpack Program, a community effort that provides free breakfasts, main meals, and snacks on weekends and school vacation weeks to many students in the towns served by the Fall Mountain Regional School District. As the grant application noted, "The teachers, nurses, and staff at Fall Mountain are trained to recognize student hunger when they see it. Hopefully this program ... will reduce the number of students that we see coming to school hungry."

\$1,000 went to Feeding Tiny Tummies, a Keene-based, all-volunteer nonprofit that provides fresh produce, bread, milk, and nonperishables to schools, day cares, and individuals in the Monadnock region. Founded in 2017, the organization has grown to include a resource center for job seekers, seniors, and other groups.

The Social Justice Fund was created in 2019, with broad community support, to honor former pastor Rev. Dawn Garrett-Larsen at the conclusion of her ministry in Nelson. The grants are given with no restrictions.

We thank the many people in our larger community who have contributed to the fund over the years. Your generosity has made this work possible.

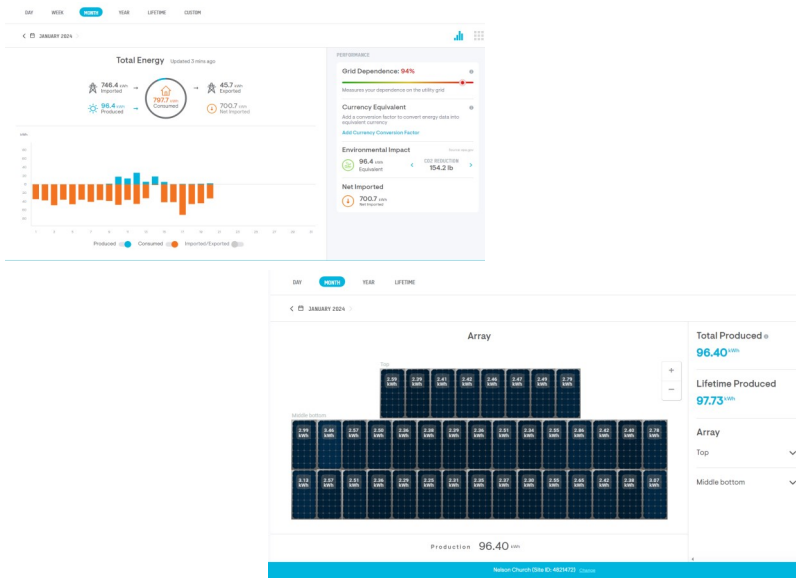

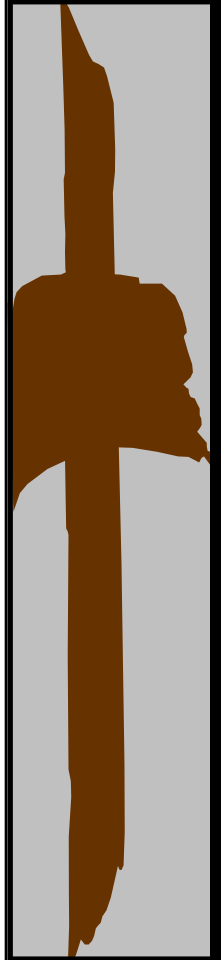
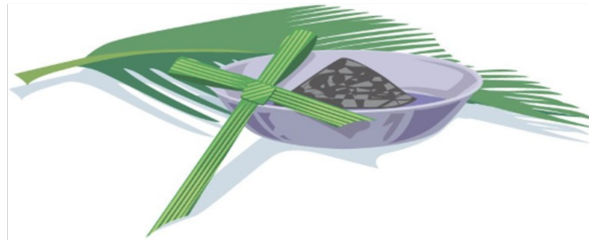
